- Incumbent Russ Feingold leads the state's senate race by 23%. This is a statistically significant difference between the candidates, and thus we can generalize to the voting age population as a whole that Feingold leads the race.
- Among the undecideds Feingold also leads over Michels 26% to 18% respectively, though fully 50% of the undecideds said they do not lean toward one candidate or the other. See table below.

- As seen in the table above, respondents felt Feingold would do a better job than Michels on each of the issues presented.
- Among all respondents, Michels fared fairly evenly between foreign policy issues and domestic issues like the economy and taxes and fared relatively less well on health care, education and the environment.

- 18% of Republicans said they would vote for Feingold, whereas 6% of Democrats said they would vote for Michels.
- Two-thirds of Independents said they supported Feingold.

Age

• Michels has relatively more support among the 35-44 and 55-64 age categories than the other age groups. For example, Michels received 38% of each of the 35-44 and 55-64 age categories compared to 15% among 18 to 24 years olds, 26% among 35 to 39 year olds, 29% in the 45 to 54 range and 35% among seniors.
