Grants range from \$10,000-100,000 and
can be for up to two years.

National Endowment for the Humanities Fellowships provide \$4,200 per month to fund full time work in the Humanities for six to twelve months. Proposals are due May 1.

Funding for Science Equipment
The National Science Foundation Earth
Sciences: Instrumentation and Facilities
program provides grants up to \$1,000,000
for equipment for use in research in the
earth sciences. Due third Monday in
July.

Compliance Corner:

St. Norbert College's Institutional Review Board (IRB) is a committee that has been formally designated to approve, monitor, and review biomedical and behavioral research involving humans. This includes research conducted by faculty as well as students. Their primary goal is to protect human subjects from physical or psychological harm. Any faculty, staff or student conducting research involving human subjects or private information obtained about individuals must apply for IRB approval although some research may be exempt from review and other research posing minimal risk may be subject to expedited review.
