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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course explores the dynamic relationships between Christianity and contemporary culture and societies. It focuses on the development of contextual theologies and the unique challenges and opportunities of postmodern society for shaping a distinct Christian identity. Theories and methods of evangelization and of "New Evangelization" will be examined in light of these new cultural and global realities.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. To introduce students to the concepts of evangelization, culture, cross-cultural ministry, the mission of the Church, theologies of the last 50-75 years around the world and the concept of "New Evangelization". This will, hopefully, provide a theological basis of vocabulary and practice.
- 2. To present various ways of engaging with these concepts in reality, and how they impact one another—such as cross-cultural evangelization; the mission of the universal church as experienced in diverse cultures and inner-dynamics of evangelization among various groups of people.
- 3. To look at the response of the Church to various cultures in light of evangelization.
- 4. To explore a process for building a church community that is intercultural in its approach to evangelization.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

1. Participate in the classes, which will depend heavily on discussion, shared ideas/questions and insights of students.

- 2. Read *Building Intercultural Competence for Ministers* and *Jesus is my Uncle* prior to the first weekend. Read *Disunity in Christ* prior to the second weekend and *Building a Bridge* prior to the third weekend.
- 3. Read 2 more books from the bibliography included with this syllabus, depending on your interest and inclination.
- 4. Before the second class, provide a 3-sentence description of what you would like to write your paper on. Before the third class, provide an updated précis of what your paper will discuss. This should be no more than 1 ½ pages.

POST-COURSE REQUIREMENT

The final requirement is a paper, no longer than 10 pages on a particular aspect of the course: evangelization, cross-cultural mission; culture and evangelization, future of evangelization needs, etc. Date due: October 14, 2018.

EVALUATIONS AND GRADING

Participation 25%

All students are expected to come to class prepared to discuss the assigned readings, writing assignments, and material previously presented in class. Grades will be based on students' level of engagement and quality of contribution to the class.

Writing 25%

There will be three (3) preliminary papers. These will be collected, but not graded. Completion receives full credit.

Post Class Paper – Evangelization/Enculturation 50% See above requirements. Paper must be written in the Chicago writing style.

COURSE SCHEDULE/DESIGN

- 1. The class meets for three weekends (Friday evenings and Saturdays). (approximately 20 hours).
