Call to Order by Executive Board (9:00)

New SGA Event Ideas (Molly Freye)

State of the College Spring Semester

Freye: Some community members and VP of Student Affairs Joe Webb are excited to continue this state of the college town hall events. Students could submit questions ahead of time, we talked about parking, crosswalk signs, COVID, etc. This time we would like to focus on a specific topic, possibly counseling here on campus, and have staff of CAPS be at the event. Or we could completely change direction and have some sort of event to still update students on campus.

Freye: The only question I sent directly to the student was regarding health and wellness, which I asked Crystal Woller and sent her reply to the student. Dressel: I think we should make it as broad reaching as we can. As wise of use of time as possible. Big ticket items such as parking.

Board of Trustees Spring Meetings (Porter Beilfuss)

Beilfuss: The spring semester BoT meetings are this week on Thursday. Fitz, Johnny, and I will be presenting at the student affairs meeting, which has a focus on the physical and mental/emotional health of students on campus. Both Dr. Bruce Robertson and Chrystal Woller are presenting to the board, and us representatives will follow them. Printer Survey (James Fitzwater)

Fitzwater: The survey was sent out secondary to me meeting with Rick Warpinski, Director of Auxiliary Services. Right now I cannot give an estimate to what this will cost us, there are a couple upperclassmen dorms like Gries, Hugh, Doksany, P/X, or St. Joe's that do not have a printer. Meeting with them sometime in the future about where we sit with printers. Seeing how much people use printers, the work flows. We got about 367 responses on the survey for printers. For people living in houses, they should just put the nearest printers to them.

Bui: For the printers, how many people does their need to be to have a printer in their house? Obviously, Hugh Hall or Gries has a lot more people.

Dressel: The printers are not maintenance-less, so the SAFAC fund is not applicable in this circumstance. It would be great to have students who do not have access to printers receive the printers, we could front the cost but maybe get refunded by REH.

Hess: I would agree with that, it should not be up to us to have a printer in every house.

Makope: Hugh Hall would be a great place to get a printer, since it is near Doksany and Roggenburg. If one was put in Premontre or Xanten as well, it could be used by students in college houses as well. Gonnering: If we have this fund for student activities, it seems like this money could be used to help fund the printers.

Thomas: It seems like it would benefit many of the students.

Smith: Instead of having to take the walk to the library, it would help to have one in the carriage house for people living in the townhouses.

Bui: About the cost, ITS pays for the cost of the paper. For the printers, we can buy the printers or lease them. Pay the maintenance cost each year for a company to fix it. When we lease it, whoever we lease it from does the repair. We used to have three distributors, now we have two. Trying to get down to one distributor. If the college wants to buy or lease the printers, who do we buy it from?

Dressel: We are interested in getting students printers. But we want to be strategic about where we put them, and then go to ITS about how much money SGA can contribute to this fund.

Hess: Do we need to talk to someone about what and how we use this fund? We need to have a discussion about what this fund is really for.

Freye: Helen and I met with John Seckel last week and looked at the contract for the SAFAC fund. If it does not benefit all students directly, we can adjust the language to reflect our needs. The closest thing it says is that "to continue the equipment fund for the potential to benefit the students at St. Norbert College." As long as we keep in mind how this can benefit the student body.

Title IX Advisory Committee (Fitzwater)

Fitzwater: I need a replacement or two for the Title IX Advisory committee, and working with the VAWA grant as well. We did a survey last year and the year before. We did resources, the new mirror clings, nothing insane but every other week an hour. If anyone is interested please let me know.

Associate AD Abby Gildernick left the college for a new position at UW-Oshkosh. Instead of hiring a new person for her position, they promoted two part-time coaches at the college to full-time. They also promoted the head coach of baseball, Mike Wallerich, to full-time, where he is now in charge of compliance, finances, and budgeting within the department. Lastly, AD Cam Fuller and Faculty-Athletic Representative Dr. Charley Jacobs traveled to the annual NCAA convention, where they attended multiple seminars on various topics regarding collegiate athletics. One such seminar was on mental health of college student-athletes.

Bui: Eric Dunning is checking with the icty of De Pere since it is not just the college that needs to approve. Will probably not be done anytime soon with the city involved and all. Looking at a newer crosswalk without a button but with a sensor for motion. Update the technology for the crosswalk by the library as well. Knights Owl furniture we have not heard back, the organization has disbanded. The printers for the rez halls are also on the table. \$3500 for the new hammock garden, but there will be construction on that side of campus this summer for hall renovations. Both Carol and Brian have responded yes to a possible professional event. Also, the software for the LSE office that we approved last semester is still being negotiated, trying to see how much money SGA would have to pay. Right now, the server memory on campus is only 14 days, looking to upgrade the server memory. Possible camera replacements around campus? 160 cameras, our fund would not support this endeavor.

Freye: We also thought about changing the language, since the security camera project is potentially long-term. There is a separate equipment fund, it generates 8K yearly. What if 75% of those funds went through replacing those cameras slowly? If we don't update the server, the amount of time the camera records would still remain at 14 days. The 25% would still be available for students. The security cameras could help any survivors of sexual assault on campus, and if they need to reference the cameras, the server update would make a difference. How do we want to approach this? Buy the server, reword the fund to give back 3-4 cameras each year, and try to prioritize freshman dorms and then work to the more exposed, at-risk areas on campus. Freshman women are more likely to experience gender-based violence. Student safety and events like last year such as thefts and robberies. Cameras were out and not working. Safety and equipment part of the fund. We did talk a fair amount about this fund.

Dressel: Is there a date that we need to spend this money?

Freye: Not that I am aware of.
